Mr. Abbott has been in private practice since 1983. During his more than 25 years of experience, he has represented public agencies, private developers and property owners on land use matters throughout California. As special counsel on numerous land use matters, his experience includes lead counsel for major development projects, trial advocacy, and counseling pertaining to initiatives and referenda involving land use approvals.
